COVID-19 RISK ASSESSMENT

(Revised for full reopening in September 2020)



The aim of the risk assessment is to implement protective measures to prevent COVID-19 or reduce the spread of the infection if there is a positive case, both in the school and transmission to the wider community.

COVID-19 Risk Assessment for reopening school

ASSESS

Decide appropriate control measures for all staff to implement under a 'Plan', 'Do', 'Review' cycle.

The preventative measures in this risk assessment are not mandatory but are provided as guidance on reducing the risk of transmission

Who may be at risk: Employees, pupils and young people, families (parents, carers and siblings), visitors, contractors, members of the public.

Consider staggering break times and lunch times to avoid mixing and time for cleaning surfaces Prepare arrangements to allow remote learning to take place should a partial or full closure of the school be required, at any point in the next academic year. <p>Policies and procedures</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Update policies to reflect changes brought about by COVID-19, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Safeguarding/child protection Behaviour Visitors to school Establish a visitors' protocol so that parents, contactors etc are clear about the infection control measures that you have in place. <p>Response to any infection</p>	<p>measures on school website.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Parents and pupils informed about the process that has been agreed for drop off and collection. Ensure parents have a point of contact for reassurance as to the plans put in place. Limit the equipment pupils bring into school each day to essentials such as lunch boxes, hats, coats, books, stationery and mobile phones. Bags are allowed. All pupils told to provide personal equipment (pens, pencils, rulers calculators etc.) to ensure no shared use in class. Parents informed only one parent to accompany child to school. Parents and pupils encouraged to walk or cycle where possible. Clear messages to pupils about 		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Staff to avoid close face to face contact and minimise time spent within 1 metre of anyone as far as is possible. Supply teachers, peripatetic teachers and/or other temporary staff to minimise contact and maintain as much distance as possible from other staff. The occupancy of staff rooms and offices limited. Use of staff rooms to be minimised. Use a simple 'no touching' approach for young children to understand the need to maintain distance. PPE is only needed in a very small number of cases, including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • where an individual child or young person becomes ill with coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms while at schools, and only then if a distance of 2 metres cannot be maintained • where a child or young person already has routine intimate care needs that involves the use of PPE, in which case the same PPE should continue to be used. <p>First Aid</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Check if qualifications run out. Consider enrolling more staff on training. 	
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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Out of school settings for children are permitted if those responsible for them are ready to do so and they can do so safely, following COVID-19 Secure guidelines. • The use of indoor facilities by adults should remain closed until guidance changes, apart from toilets and throughways. • A risk assessment should determine the maximum capacity of a hall or hire space while able to maintain social distancing according to the current relevant guidelines. • Outdoor sports courts and other outdoor sporting activities have also been permitted. • Outdoor and indoor swimming pools will remain closed. • Any groups hiring the facilities must refer to relevant government 		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Use of hand sanitiser upon boarding and/or disembarking • Cleaning of vehicles between each journey. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Employees providing first aid to pupils will not be expected to maintain 2 metres distance. 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	<p>guidance or their own associations and national governing body for guidance on running the club or event following the COVID-19 guidelines.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The school can ask any hiring organisation to provide evidence of their risk assessment. • Review existing lettings/hire agreements and amend or supplement as necessary to include specifics of what the school will do and what the hirers are responsible for (e.g. cleaning, sharing equipment, hand washing or sanitiser, what happens if anyone shows symptoms or tests positive to COVID-19, etc.).
